

Q: How long have you been involved in the diamond industry and where and how did your involvement begin?

A: I've been involved in the industry for 30 years now. I am part of a third generation family of jewellers. I've been polishing jewellery and learning the trade since I was nine years old. I would stop by the business after school – and I've never stopped learning.

dive in because all the new changes in today's environment mean opportunities. Where it might have taken years in the past to acquire a degree of visibility, today if you are capable you can be catapulted into achieving success.

A: I believe in only a few basic rules that never fails: understand that trust is measured by your actions and that success is 10% inspiration and 90% perspiration.

Q: If you had the choice, would you consider any other profession?

A: Yes, I would have loved to have been a singer – the only problem is I need to be able to sing first.

Q: Do you hold any position in any other club or association other than the WFDB?

A: I am very involved in my local community and my children's school.

Q: Who is your role model and who in the world would you most like to meet?

A: My role model was my father who believed that you could accomplish anything if you were determined enough.
